Dear Andy and Gladys:

I would like to hear how your check-up turned out, Andy, and I would like to know, Gladys, if you have him straightened out from the way he was when he wouldn't give the hospital his name because he wanted to duck the check-up - at least that is the way I understood the conversation about it that day at the get-together.

I finally did get to a Xerox machine and have the copy of Leo's and Christine's family lineage made. I am returning herewith the sheet you sent me with the family written out by generations. Now, how about doing yours and getting the other brother and the sisters to do the same? I had a copy of the long pasted sheets I showed you when you were here made, too, and am sending Christine one of them. I wrote her and told her that before we go to Georgia we should get all the information we can from the earliest Federal censuses of Georgia so we will have an idea of where to start when we go. I looked at the little notation I showed you about William Ogg on the 1820 in Richmond County, again last night while I was writing Christine and found that I had several other small sheets clipped to it, and in one place I found I had listed a Robert Ogg as a family head in Clarke County, Georgia, the 1820 census and there were eight in his family. Clarke County is several counties away from Richmond County, has a smaller population than Richmond County, and has Athens in it. I think there is a University at Athens - the University of Georgia perhaps - I haven't had time to look that up. During World War II a worker for the Junior Red Cross stopped by the office - I was the Waller County, Texas, Jr. Red Cross Chairman - and she talked so very "Georgia-like" that I asked her if she might be from Georgia and she said she was, and then I told her my grandfather came from Georgia. I think I told you of her telling me about the "Old Ogg House" near the campus where the students always went for their Hallowe'en parties. Well perhaps Robert was our forebear, and we may have some ghost kin in the house. When we go to the Library to check up on Oggs before we go to Georgia we should trace Robert, to, for he is just as likely to be our great, great, grandpa as William is, although on down the line here in Texas Cousin listed two Wills, one the Will Ogg we knew and one Will Ryalls who was the son of Elizabeth Ogg in her second marriage. Sometimes little bits of information like that can give a clue as to where to search.

I hope Christine and I and you if you can - and also Edna who says she would like to go - can go to Georgia to try to get our background. Before going we should also find out all we can about Great Grandpa's first wife, a Suggs, and about his second wife, Martha Fulshear. He married them both in Georgia, I think from what Cousin Cassie has written.

The next time you come by to see me, if my dark green Ford, No. 111, is not in my driveway under the pine trees, drive on around the corner of the block and see if it is in the driveway beside the house with the screened in front porch, across from the Sweetbriar Home. That is Willie's house that I trying to get moved into.
